Groundbreaking Kicks Off Irrigation Project

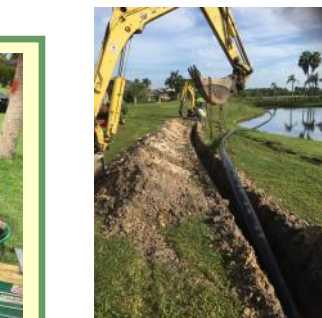
On Wednesday, September 30th, a ground breaking was held with members of the negotiating team, the HOA Board, Troon-GGP leaders, and a few residents who were in attendance to kick off construction of this long anticipated project.






After a massive amount of materials were staged in the Club parking lot in September, the contractor, Leibold Irrigation, started construction on October 5th.



Since then, those residents adjacent to the King course have been able to watch and report to others as the main backbone water line was trenched into the course behind their homes.

The pipe is first fitted to the pipe fusing jig. Then a 'hotplate' is inserted between the two ends. The pipe is heated for 4 min 30 seconds, then the pipes are pressed together and allowed to set for 3 minutes.



Lateral runs to the fairways, T-boxes, and greens do not require trenching as the feeder piping is pulled underground into place by a prime mover vehicle.

While the trenching was invasive, the end result is hard to detect without close scrutiny making it appear to be a non invasive process. Look to the immediate left of the cart path and you can see where the sod was put back down.

Timeline...Looking forward

- End of Oct Main pump station upgrade takes place
- Nov 15th King course target completion date and Prince construction begins
- Dec 20- Jan 1 Shutdown of construction activity for holiday
- Late Jan. Prince course completed followed by Installation of the system on the driving range, putting and chipping greens.
- Feb – April Break in course construction for snowbird golf season to proceed unabated
- Late Spring Entire 27 holes are completed



Irrigation Progress Report (cont.)

Concurrently with this activity, a temporary connection of the main backbone to the irrigation pump station has taken place. This complicated intersection is necessary to support operation of both old and new systems during the project and will be removed at the end of the project.

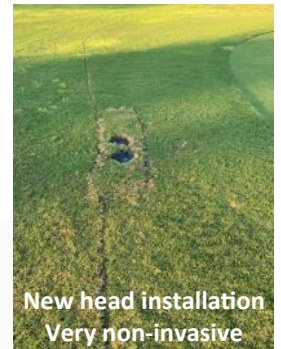
Physical placement of the irrigation heads on the King course has taken place on several holes closing in on the scheduled November 15th target completion date. The control station has been installed in the Maintenance Building, the main line flushed and installed heads tested.

The "location of the heads" and the main backbone of the project are the product of a well thought out preliminary design completed over the past year, established through capture of GPS coordinates of each head from Google Earth. Orange markers painted on the ground provide the location of the heads and the path of the main line. Once the heads are installed, the GPS coordinates will again be recorded to provide for accurate 'as-built' configuration documentation.

The upgrade to the main pump station will take place shortly. This includes repairing the deep well from which the pumps draw water, inserting a new pipe and screening connecting the deep well to the Prince 5 lake inlet, and installing a new and larger pump in the adjacent aquifer well from which additional water is drawn to supplement water drawn from the lakes.

Interesting facts about this project:

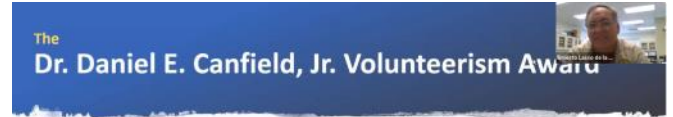
- ⇒ In total, 22.5 miles of HDPE (high density polyethylene) pipe will be installed
- ⇒ The miles of pipe are spliced without couplers using a unique precision cutting and heating process; essentially butt-welding the pipes together, resulting in a longer life, leak free service, with over a 50-year life expectancy.
- ⇒ A total of 1200+ sprinkler heads will be installed
- ⇒ Up to 90 sprinkler heads can be installed per day
- ⇒ Each sprinkler head provides feedback on its operational condition and is addressable by the main computer control system
- ⇒ Individual sprinkler head run time and flow volume can be adjusted and tuned for maximum coverage and minimum water usage, eliminating the over/under watering problem of older systems.
- ⇒ Sprinkler head maintenance can be performed without shutting down the irrigation system.
- ⇒ A graphical view of the health of the entire system is always available in real time on the central computer system.

We are fortunate to have such an experienced crew working on this project. They are moving quickly and very efficiently to meet the established timelines. John Gold, CRGC Superintendent, wants to thank everyone in the community for their support of this much needed project.

Congratulations SWM Pond Watch Committee



Pond Watch

The Lee County Hyacinth Control District Pond Watch Program is a citizen volunteer monitoring program established in 1993 to educate citizens about management of storm water ponds. Homeowners sample waters throughout the year to learn about the conditions that trigger aquatic weed and algae problems.

Ernesto Lasso de la Vega, Pond Watch Coordinator, Lee County Hyacinth Control District, reports that the Pond Watch Program in which Cape Royal participates, has received the Dr. Daniel E. Canfield, Jr. Volunteerism Award by the Florida Lake Management Society.

This award honors the outstanding work of volunteer organizations for significant contributions to the preservation of our water resources. Ernesto accepted the award at a Virtual Meeting on August 27, on behalf of the 108 volunteers that have sampled ponds since 1993.

He said the program is an educational experience for homeowners and the district. All of the volunteers have become experts in their communities, providing water quality information and best management practices to improve or maintain the conditions of your ponds.”

Congratulations and thank you to our Cape Royal Leads, Gregg Forsberg and Dave Lahr for their the ongoing dedication to ensure our water samples are taken to Lehigh Acres each month. Please thank them along with the whole team which includes Ed Benninghoff, Jean Carlson, Clydie Douglass, Phyllis Mills, Gary Myles, Mark Knoth, Millie Damon, Bill Ready, Paul Boggs, Chuck Hibbert, Karen Way and Lin Willett, led by the SWM Lakes Subcommittee Chair, Neil Price, for their ongoing dedication for keeping our 23 man-made ponds healthy.

WOW! 10,000 Littorals Planted in One Day

In early October, the Surface Water Management Committee oversaw the planting of 10,000 littorals within the water’s edge of many of our lakes by Woods and Wetlands, Inc. These are shore plants planted in the water to help protect the shoreline against erosion and improve the water quality of our lakes.

About half of all the plants were planted on the golf course side of the lakes. The others were installed behind homes where a significant shelf along the water’s edge had been identified, but the shoreline did not need future grading.

As restoration proceeds over the next few years, more littorals will be added to areas of shoreline. For those affected, the SWM Committee asks residents to please advise their landscape companies to NOT spray or weed eat these plants. Signs will be added in 2021.

Next 2020 Covenant Inspection Date Is Monday, Dec. 7

The Covenants team would like to welcome all our Northern friends back to Sunny, Hot Florida.

The first inspection on October 5th is in the books and 36 first notices were sent out. Second notices will be going out the week of Nov. 1st. If you received a first or second notice please respond to the notice. That way we know you have received either one or both of the notices from the first inspection.

We did have a bit of a problem with the weather during our first inspection, so we may have passed on a few roofs and drives because we really could not determine if they were really dirty and needed to be cleaned. Take a look at your property and compare it to the others in the area and decide if it needs cleaning.

The Covenants Team will again be out in golf carts on Dec. 7th to scout along the community roads and cart paths for any issues that are noticeably out of keeping with our HOA rules. Committee Chair, Parker Cortner, says, "Contacting us at crhoacc@gmail.com regarding items in work or circumstances after a violation letter is received, is the most important part of this process for you and our team!"

Next Major Inspection: **Monday, December 7th**

Key areas to be reviewed include:

Roofs – includes a review of gutters, downspouts, fascia, chimneys, and other attachments.

Driveways – include paths and walkways to doors.

Major Landscaping Issues – includes stone walls, garden curbing and other outside structures.

Home Exteriors – includes walls, trim, doors, and garage doors, as well as cage frames and screens, the lanai and stem walls and the pool and patio surfaces.

Please keep in mind that the Covenants Committee always accepts complaints for violations year around and sends notifications to homeowners as necessary. Currently, the big issues are unmowed lots, overgrown yards and flower beds and driveways with weeds. The committee will send out letters of notification of these issues to the homeowners and if not corrected, will follow up with a second and if needed, a third violation notice.

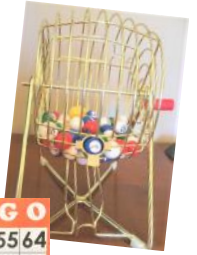


Bingo Was Back in a Big Way
